INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

We have audited the statement of assets, liabilities, and net assets – cash basis as of December 31, 2014 of Pride of Quakertown (a nonprofit organization) and the related statements of revenues and expenses – cash basis for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the cash basis of accounting as described in Note 2, this includes determining that the cash basis of accounting is an acceptable basis for the preparation of the financial statements in the circumstances. Management is also responsible for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the assets, liabilities, and net assets of Pride of Quakertown as of December 31, 2014, and its support, revenue, and expenses for the year then ended in accordance with the cash basis of accounting as described in Note 2.

The financial statements are prepared on the cash basis of accounting, which is a basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Notes to Basic Financial Statements
December 31, 2014

Note 1 – Nature of Operation

The Pride of Quakertown is a Pennsylvania Corporation with tax exempt status under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 formed to provide scholarships for children under the age of 18, to participate in co-curricular activities within the Quakertown area community. The Organization has developed partnerships with a variety of recreational program leaders to determine the best way to include scholarship recipients into their desired program. The Organization is supported through fundraising events, donations, and sponsorship income.

Note 2 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The Organization prepares its financial statements on the cash basis of accounting. Under the cash basis of accounting revenues are recognized when received rather than when earned and expenses are recognized when paid rather than incurred. Consequently, fixed assets, debt, accounts receivable, trade accounts payable, and accrued expenses are not included in the financial statements as of December 31, 2014.

Financial Statement Presentation

In accordance with the FASB accounting standards codification, the Organization reports its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets.

Income Taxes

The Organization is exempt from Federal Income Taxes under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and classified by the Internal Revenue Service as other than a private foundation.

Contributions

Contributions received are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted net assets depending on the existence or nature of any donor restrictions.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Organization considers all highly liquid investments available for current use with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

At December 31, 2014, the carrying amounts of the Organization's cash and equivalents at commercial banks were \$24,510 and the bank balances were \$26,612, which is covered by Federal Deposit Insurance. The difference between the carrying amount and the bank balance is outstanding checks.
